



**The Wrong Fairy Tale**  
**Goldilocks and the Three Little Pigs**  
By Tracey Turner, illustrated by Summer Macon

As you read along, ask the child the following questions:

- Why is the little girl named Goldilocks? Why do you suppose she's walking in the woods?
- Who do you think lives in this house?
- What do you suppose that delicious smell might be?
- Why have the Three Little Pigs shut themselves in a cupboard?
- Who is really knocking on the door?
- Are the pigs' chores the same as the ones done at your house?
- What is porridge? What's really in the bowls? What do you think "pig swill" is?
- Why does the wolf want to come into the pigs' house?
- What do you think happened to the Big Bad Wolf? Why do you think he never came back to the little brick house?
- How do you think the pigs feel after the wolf leaves?



Further questions and activities for after reading the book.

- Ask which is their favorite page in the book and why.
- If the child is familiar with the traditional Goldilocks story, ask how the two stories differ. Which do they prefer?
- Encourage the child to make up a story in which some other fairy-tale character comes to the pigs' house or in which Goldilocks visits someone else. Suggest they draw pictures for their story.
- Together, choose two other fairy tales and help the child to mix them up to make up and illustrate their own "Wrong Fairy Tale."
- Read the story again and ask the child to join in on the onomatopoeia, the wolf's demands and cries, and the pigs' replies.
